Bible Dictionaries

Bible dictionaries provide numerous articles on important biblical topics, themes, persons, or ideas. The purpose and the audience will range depending on the dictionary.

Lexham Bible Dictionary (Free!)

• This resource only exists in a digital format (accessible on a computer, tablet, or smart phone). However, it is one of the best Bible dictionaries available (and yet it is free!). It has over 7,000 articles written by over 700 contributors of biblical scholarship.

New Dictionary of Biblical Theology

• This resource has over 200 articles on key themes in the Bible (such as creation, kingdom of God, atonement, etc.). Each article is written to give you a cover-to-cover understanding of the biblical theme. It contains readable articles written by trusted scholars.

IVP Bible Dictionary Series (8 vols.)

• This collection covers the whole scope of the Bible spread over 8 volumes (though the volumes can be purchased individually based on interest). Since each volume specializes in a different part of the Bible, the articles are more specific and contextualized to the interpretive issues of that section of Scripture. The series is excellent and credible.

Holman Illustrated Bible Dictionary

• This resource is the easiest read of this list. While it will not be the most in-depth resource it is accessible and useful.

Resources for Word Studies

Word studies are an enriching part of Bible study, but they are not without their challenges. These resources are the most difficult to understand if someone has not been trained in biblical languages. However, even a lay person can learn to wade through these resources and glean from their insights. Otherwise, word studies will be left to the times and occasions when other resources (like commentaries or Bible dictionaries) bring up the word. Listed are only the most user-friendly resources, forgoing a more extensive list that academics or biblical trained ministers would look to.
