Going Deeper Into the Message

God invites us to join His mission to: Bring Health, Give Hope, End Human Suffering!

Read Luke 4:18-19; Psalm 82:3-4

Point 1 – Refuse to let injustice be the end result.

Psalm 82:3–4 (NIV) **Defend** the weak and the fatherless; **uphold** the cause of the poor and the oppressed. **Rescue** the weak and the needy; **deliver** them from the hand of the wicked.

God has always implored his people to play a participatory role in securing justice for those who cannot themselves. Now, "justice" takes a plethora of shapes and forms. Justice might mean rescuing girls from sex trafficking; it might be providing clean and sustainable drinking water; it might be giving medical aid. Justice is everything that rights a wrong in the world. And as Christians, our motivation for justice is two-fold: First, to provide immediate aid to needs that are tangible and provide a better quality of

life. Second, and even more importantly, to provide the gospel of Jesus to every person we can. We do good work in the world, but not as an end in itself, but to lead people to the good news of Jesus the Lord.

We aren't called to accept the way things are. The world is fallen, not as God created or intended it, but God has shown himself to be a Redeemer. He does not settle for the brokenness. He is committed to rescuing creation, and so we are too! We refuse to be desensitized to the pain around the world. If we have connections and a plan to alleviate or even eradicate a problem, we are going to do it. We care because God cares!

For us, injustice is a reality that must be dealt with. Injustice won't get the final word in God's story, and we play an active role in relieving suffering and providing ultimate hope in our generation.

Questions for Group Discussion or Personal Reflection

- Re-read Psalm 82:3–4. The four main verbs are defend, uphold, rescue, deliver. Which of those verbs captures your attention the most? Why?
- How does Jesus' Messianic mission, announced in Luke 4:18–19, inspire our mission as Christians?
- If you are honest with yourself, are you desensitized to the pain in the world?
 What wakes you up to the reality of the pain in the world but also your purpose in responding to it?

God invites us to join His mission to: Bring Health, Give Hope, End Human Suffering!

Read Psalm 106:3; John 20:21; 2 Corinthians 9:6–9

Point 2 – Participate in sharing God's blessing with others.

Psalm 106:3 (NIV) Blessed are those who act justly, who always do what is right.

God honors those who "act justly" and "do what is right." Participating in God's making right the wrongs in the world is not "extra credit" for us as Christians, it is essential to the core of who we are! And yet, although we cannot always determine what that blessing will look like, God's blessing does rest on us when we are obedient to the various ways he calls us to live.

We all here have been "blessed" immensely. To not step up and do my part in acting justly is to deny that God has blessed me abundantly. We should always move in the direction that brings healing.

And know this: God's blessing rests on you and me when we do our part in his mission!

So, where do we go from here? What are we to do?

It comes down to this: Pray, give, and go-and watch what God does.

- Pray-because prayer is not the least we can do, it is the most we can do.
 Leaning on the power of heaven is where we draw upon the God of infinite power and resources—and also—infinite compassion. God unleashes change in the world through a praying Church.
- Give—because when we ask God what our part is the answer is never zero. The bigger our prayers the bigger our participation. That's because God has determined to bring change in the world through his people. It is no mistake that the Church is called "the <u>body</u> of Christ." And one primary way to participate is by funding—being gospel patrons in the world. By doing so we are literally extending the arms of Christ over the people and projects we are partnering with on the ground all over the world!
- Go-because we are excited to announce that starting in 2023 there will be more opportunities than there have been the past two years to "go" be boots on the ground for missions both locally and globally.
